Orders Against County's Clubs, Houses Due Today

Judges Slated To Issue Injunctions

District Judge Donald M. Markle of the 10th District Court and Judge W. E. Stone of 56th District Court are expected to begin signing temporary restraining orders Tuesday afternoon against 47 alleged gambling and prostitution houses and night spots of Galveston County, District Clerk H. H. Treeacre said at noon.

State Attorney General Will Wilson is seeking temporary restraining orders, temporary and permanent injunctions against the operators of the various establishments to keep them from openly and flagrantly violating the laws of the State of Texas.

Ten of Wilson's assistants made a history-making move Monday when they filed suits seeking the restraining orders and injunctions.

The move followed the closedown of Island and Mainland gambling late last week on the eve of mass raids by more than 100 lawmen. The raid, planned as the biggest in the history of the state, never came off and the officers cancelled their plans when reports of the volunteer closedown came in from undercover agents.

The filing of the suits was the first time petitions have been presented on such wholesale basis.

Judge Markle was trying a criminal case and Judge Stone was hearing a civil suit Tuesday morning, Treeacre said.

"They will start hearing and signing them this afternoon," Treeacre said.

Treeacre said the judges were expected to stagger the hearings, due to the large number of petitions filed. The petitions were so bulky they were brought into the clerk's office in boxes.

Assistant Attorney General Cecil Rotsch said Monday night his office intends to make the closedown permanent.

"We are doing the best we can to keep Galveston County closed," Rotsch said, "We will continue to do so, Galveston County will not be open if Will Wilson can prevent it - and I predict he will prevent it."

Places named ranged from the plush Balinese Room to upstairs bawdy houses.

It was also disclosed with the filing of the petitions that the undercover operators who have put in several months of investigations were James D. "Buddy" Givens, 33, of 2207 Scott, La Marque, an employee of Republic Oil and Refining Co., and Carrol S. Yaws, 37, of Alta Loma, an employee of American Oil Co.

Givens is chairman of the Galveston County Democratic Executive Committee.

Yaws or Givens accompanied each petition, showing that the pair, working together, went into various establishments, buying drinks, playing slot machines, blackjack and dice, or talking to the inmates of the bawdy houses.

Each petition was signed by Wilson, Rotsch, Assistant Attorneys General J. L. Smith, Edwin P. Horner and Richard B. Stone, and James P. Simpson, Texas City attorney and former FBI agent who has been working on the cases as special assistant attorney general.

Listed in the various petitions are the following defendants:

Louise Bird a femme sole, 2320 Avenue O, operator of the Pirate Club, 2212 Avenue O. The affidavit signed by Givens alleges that on March 21 at 8:25 p.m. he went into the Pirate Club with Yaws to investigate alleged liquor and gambling law violations at the request of the attorney general. Givens said they purchased drinks of scotch and soda at 75 cents per drink, saw a five-cent slot machine in the club, at which Givens lost 45 cents and Yaws, 50 cents. They visited the club on April 9 and April 23 and went through the same procedure, they said.

Jo-jo Hatch and Dottie Malone, 2709 1/2 Market street. The affidavit was signed by Yaws, who said that on May 8, in company with Givens, he went to the 2709 1/2 Club, bought a drink of scotch and soda, and talked to one of the girls who said she was "available." The two men again visited the establishment on May 15.

Joe T. Hanson, 216 Pompano, operator of the Imperial Club, 2319 avenue E. The affidavit is signed by Yaws, who said he and Givens went into the place, bought drinks of scotch and soda; Yaws lost \$1 in a five-cent slot machine and \$2 at a black jack table while Givens lost \$5 at the black jack table.

Rainbow Club

Joseph J. Slemensky, 227 avenue P. operator of the Rainbow Club, 114-116 20th Street. The affidavit is signed by Givens, who says he and Yaws bought drinks of scotch and soda for 75 cents.

Victor Fertitta, 4806 Woodrow, Anthony J. Fertitta, 4607 avenue O, Sam Serio, 8 North Circle Drive, Edwin Earl Llewellyn, 101 Bonita, Tom A. Fertitta, 5301 Menard, and Gulf Properties, Inc., Frank Maceo, president, operators of the Balinese Room, 2107 Seawall Boulevard. The affidavit signed by Givens, recites that on April 29, Givens and Yaws and their wives went to the Western Room and a receptionist assisted them in getting into the Balinese Room by making a telephone call. After they were admitted, they ordered drinks of scotch and soda, and saw three dice tables and two roulette tables in a room behind the bar and six slot machines and a race horse machine in a room back of the gaming room. The affidavit says Givens placed bets on the roulette table and lost \$10, went to the dice table and won some money but ended up by breaking even. They visited the Balinese Room again on May 3, 17, and 24.

Metropole Club

Dorothy B. Graham, 4121 avenue B. operator of the Metropole Club. The affidavit is signed by Givens, who said he and Yaws bought drinks of scotch and soda in the place.

Victor Fertitta, et al., Gulf Properties, Inc., operators of the Western Room on the third floor of the Turf Grill Building, 2214 Market Street. The affidavit is signed by Givens who said he went to the Western Room on April 8 at 11:30 p.m., bought drinks of scotch and soda, and lost \$7 at the black jack table and won \$30 in a dice game, while Yaws won \$10 at the black jack table and lost \$8 at the dice game. They again visited the Western Room on April 19 and went through the same procedure, they said.

Dorothy Tyler, 419 34th Street, operator of the 419 Club. In his affidavit, Yaws says he and Givens went to the 419 Club on May 10, bought drinks of scotch and soda for 75 cents per drink, and lost \$1 in a five-cent slot machine.

Gus L. Salanovich, 5127 avenue P 1/2, and Joe Forrest, 2320 avenue H, operators of the Embassy Club, 2320 avenue E. The affidavit is signed by Yaws, who said he and Givens went to the Embassy Club May 17, bought drinks of scotch and soda and lost \$3 at the black jack table.

Idle Hour Club

John P. Moriarty, 3520 avenue G, operator of the Idle Hour Club, 1903 23rd street. The affidavit is signed by Yaws, who alleges that on May 3 he

and Givens went to the Idle Hour Club, bought drinks of scotch and soda and lost \$2 and \$5, respectively on a slot machine and broke even at the black jack table.

Diambod S. Athanaston 5023 avenue P 1/2, Peter S. Athanaston, 712 17th street and John S. Athaston, 708 17th street, operators of the Ricksha Room, 800 North Boulevard. The affidavit is signed by Yaws, who alleges that on May 11 he and Givens went to the Ricksha Room, bought drinks of scotch and soda, saw three console model slot machines in the place and lost \$5. They again visited the place May 24 and May 31.

Johnny Johnson, operator of Club C, located on "the Strip" at Kemah. The affidavit is signed by Givens, who says he and Yaws went into Club C on April 6, bought drinks of scotch and soda. Givens lost \$2 on a console model slot machine while Yaws lost \$1.50. The two men visited the club again on May 4, May 14 and June 2.

Marie Allen, 2015 1/2 avenue E, and Margaret Lera, 3416 1/2 avenue E, operators of the Acme Room, 3713 1/2 Market street. The affidavit is signed by Yaws, who said he went to the Acme Room on May 6 with Givens, talked to one of the women in the place and ascertained she was a prostitute. They visited the establishment for a second time May 8.

Pat Stokes, 3221 Broadway, operator of the Club 83 Keys, 628 Seawall Boulevard. The affidavit by Yaws alleges purchase of drinks of scotch and soda on April 29 and May 2.

Sandbox Club

William D. Dennis, 1825 23rd street, operator of the Sandbox Club, 802 North Boulevard. The affidavit, signed by Givens, alleges purchase of drinks of scotch and soda and loss of \$1 on a slot machine.

In each case, violations of state laws against gambling and sale of liquor by the drink are alleged in the affidavits by Yaws and Givens.

"We may have missed a few, " admitted one of the attorneys general, "But we'll go after them tomorrow."

Wilson has said previously that 55 establishments were operating illegally in the county. Plans were being made for a mass raid in the county [5 June] when local establishments heard of the plans and closed voluntarily.

"They're just whittling away at it," Wilson said today in Austin when informed of the action of the assistant district attorney. "I haven't heard from them but I told them to go ahead and get injunctions against some 50-odd places in the Galveston area."

The attorney general said again he would "follow the same pattern" in other sections of the state if necessary, "but we hope it won't be necessary after Galveston."

However, no action had been reported in any other gulf coast county late Monday night.

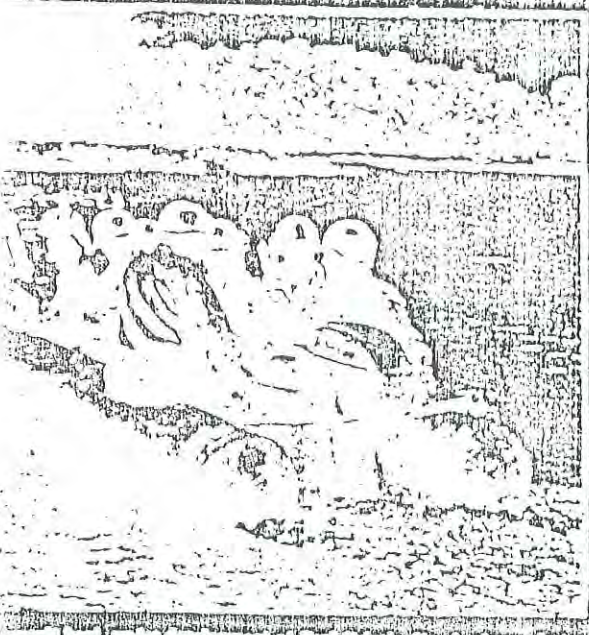

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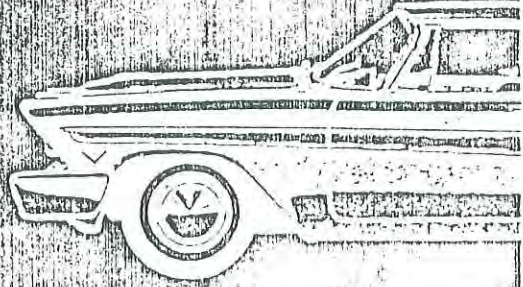
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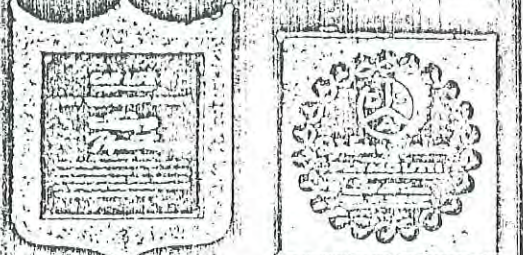
